Most classes sold on a steady kind of market with some of the butcher classes showing strength. Light yearling steers mostly \$20.00 to \$22.00 with their heifer mates selling from \$16.00 to \$17.00 cwt. One string of 600-pound yearlings sold at \$19.75 while some similar weight heifers brought \$16.90.

The bulk of the beef cows looked \$0.50 cwt. better than a week ago with best kinds selling from \$11.00 to \$12.25; high cutters \$9.75 to \$10.75 and the canners and cutters mostly \$8.50 to \$9.50 cwt. Bulls mostly \$13.50 to \$14.50 cwt.
