State Capitol News

Hospital Lack Overcome

LINCOLN—Nebraskans could take justifiable pride this week in a recent completed statewide survey of hospital facilities.

Vernon Pangborn of the state health department, who supervised the survey, said two major conclusions could be gained:

1. Nebraska in the past 10 years has largely overcome hospital deficiencies in rural areas. This has happened because of action by many communities using federal funds under the Hill-Burton program.

2. The problem now is to build up medical centers in the metropolitan areas of Omaha and Lincoln. Concentration of medical specialists, knowledge, equipment, and service in these locations can serve the entire state.

This latest survey was made at the request of the federal government. It was broader than previous studies, covering not only technical institutions such as multiple disability centers, diagnostic or treatment centers, chronic disease hospitals and skilled nursing homes.

Pangborn, head of the hospital division of the state health department, said that the gratifying thing is that the local hospital situation is so well answered in those areas that the state can now turn its attention to the medical centers.

Only one area of the state is still deficient in hospital facilities. This is in the extreme southeastern part of the state, including Richardson, Pawnee, Nemaha, and Johnson counties. While there are medical facilities there, they are mostly outmoded and outdated.

Medical Centers—The public in general has heard of the famous Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minn., and similar medical centers in the big cities of the United States.

What is not generally known is that Omaha and Lincoln now have some of the finest medical specialists in their lines in the United States. The major thing lacking to keep these cities from developing top-notch medical centers is the lack of adequate building facilities.

For the types or diseases and medical problems to be treated in such centers, a person could be brought from any part of Nebraska.

For ordinary sickness and surgery the local hospital would suffice. But the medical centers could provide the advanced type of help needed in a well-rounded medical program for the entire state.

The survey said that new diagnostic or treatment centers are not needed. But the facilities at the University of Nebraska Med-

ical college at Omaha might be expanded. Regional hospitals also might be expanded.

Rehabilitation

In considering rehabilitation facilities, the report suggested that priority go to the crippled children center being developed at the University of Nebraska hospital at Omaha; to the Creighton Memorial St. Joseph's hospital in Omaha; and that such a center be established in Lincoln.

Incidentally, the 1955 legislature appropriated \$480,000 to buy land for the crippled children center. Priority was given to the University and Creighton medical colleges as far as chronic disease hospitals was concerned.

Nursing homes also came in for discussion. The definition here was different from the usual term used by Nebraskans when referring to old folks homes.

"Nursing homes" in the survey meant homes where skilled registered nurse supervision was needed. Considerable need was shown in this area.

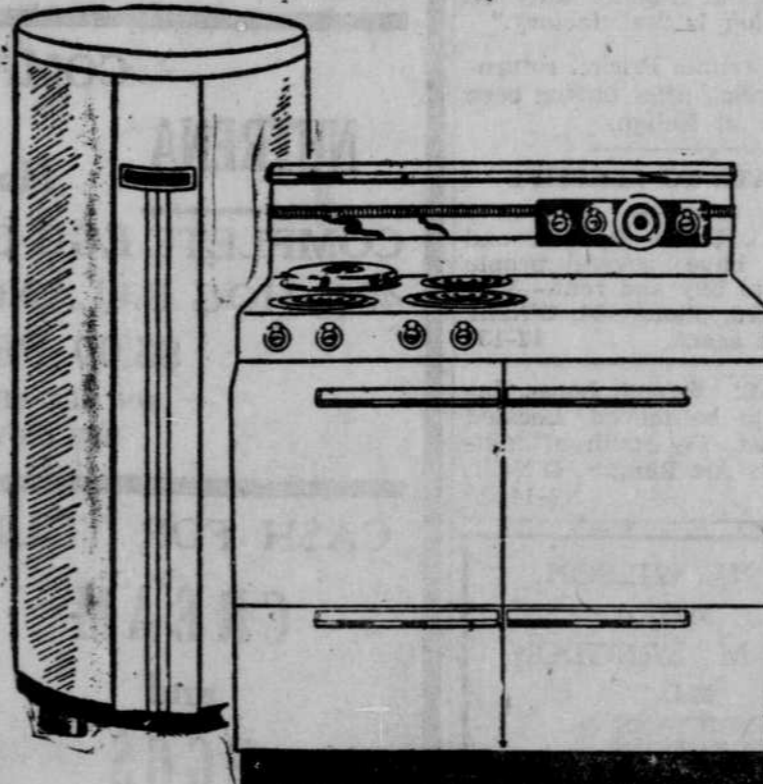
