Vernon Pangborn of the state

health department, who supervised the survey, said two major conclusions could be gained:

1. Nebraska in the past 10 years has largely overcome hospital deficiencies in rural areas. This has happened because of action by many communities using federal funds under the Hill-Burton program.

2. The problem now is to build up medical centers in the metropolition areas of Omaha and Lincoln. Concentration of medical specialists, knowlege, equipment, and service in these locations can serve the entire state.

This latest survey was made at the request of the federal government. It was broader than previous studies, covering not general hospitals but also highly technical institutions such as multiple disability centers, diagnostic or treatment centers, chronic disease hospitals and skilled nursing homes.

Pangborn, head of the hospital division of the state health department, said that the gratifying thing is that the local hospital satuation is so well answered in most areas that the state can now turn its attention to the medical centers.


