Curtis Encourages Domestic A-Bomb

Sen. Carl T. Curtis (R-Nebr.) stated Wednesday the United States is strongly supporting its desire to make available the widest possible use of atomic research for peaceful purposes. He called attention to the fact that, a few days ago, the atomic energy commission released 961 reports covering many areas of scientific and industrial interest of substantial benefit to American industry.

"It is obvious," said Senator Curtis, "that our peacetime accomplishments with atomic energy have become far more important than military uses of the atom. We are backing up our effort, as a nation, to improve living standards through the use of atomic knowledge. This is contrasted to the USSR and its satellites who still envision atomic development as purely a military asset."

Senator Curtis is covering this week in Washington with officials of the atomic energy commission and is hopeful that an atomic reactor project will soon be approved to develop power in Nebraska.
