Molasses Plum Pudding For A Feast



Plum pudding matches the festive mood and menu of the holiday season. Though not a single plum in this traditional dessert, it is full of spices and dried fruits with delicate unsulphured molasses to blend

the flavor medley.

Colonists, bringing plum pudding recipes from England, early added the sweet touch of molasses. Unsulphured molasses, then as now, possesses mellowness being the natural, concentrated juice of sun-ripened

Plum pudding can be made a day, several days, or a week before use. Remove from mold after steaming, cool and wrap in waxed paper and store in refrigerator. Then re-steam about an hour in the same greased mold before serving. Fancy molds or oven-proof casseroles may be used as containers for the pudding, and steam in a regular steamer or deep, covered kettle with a wire rack in the bottom. The trick is to keep in the steam which bakes the pudding.

MOLASSES PLUM PUDDING 1½ cups rifted all-purpose flour 3 tables poons sugar

4 cup chopped nuts
4 cup finely cut pitted dates
1 cup raisins
4 cup sliced citron

Sift together flour, sugar, salt, soda, and spices. Stir in nuts and fruit; mix well. Combine egg, unsulphured molasses, milk, and shortening; stir into dry ingredients, mixing well. Turn into a greased and floured 5-cup pudding mold with a tight-fitting cover. Or cover with aluminum foil, or two thicknesses waxed paper; tie securely. Place on rack in deep kettle; pour in boiling water to half the depth of mold. Cover; steam 2 hours, 45 minutes, adding more boiling water during steaming if necessary. Serve warm with a hard sauce, ice cream sauce, or whipped cream, with a little unsulphured molasses added. YIELD: 10 to 12 servings.


