Cards Split with Trinity, Lynch

Schaffer Dunks 29 Tuesday Evening

Holy Trinity 55; St. Mary's 46
A band of tall blonde guys from the valley of the Bow—all of them of rangy German stock—scored a handy victory over the St. Mary's academy Cardinals. The visitors are better known as the Holy Trinity Trojans of Hartington.

Trinity won, 55-46, in the game played here Friday night. For the first time this season, Coach Don Templemeyer's kids were out-shot from the field and, as usual, yielded ground at the free-throw line.

Big Dave Schaffer, a son of the Deutches soil himself, bagged 21 points and proved to be SMA's only offensive threat.

Only other card to find the range at all was Billy Craig, a trosh, who pumped in eight points during the final period.

Trinity's control of the boards and the artful goal which hung over the Cards spelled the difference. Trinity led 22-19 at the half. The SMA reserves, after trailing 20-16 at the half, emerged victorious over the Trinity seconds, 47-33. Gary Holly and Larry Tomlinson turned in 12 and 10 points, respectively.

The Inman Towners defeated the O'Neill town team, 74-71, in the nightcap.

St. Mary's 60; Lynch 23

It was win number 4 for the Cards here Tuesday night when they outclassed a hapless Lynch team, 60-23. The Cards served stern notice in the opening minutes, jumping to a 17-1 first quarter margin. Templemeyer paraded all of his kids into the fray because the outcome was never in doubt.

Schaffer again was the big gun for SMA, dunking 29 points in less than three quarters. Jim Froelich, finding the range after an early season slump, dropped in 11 points by connecting on five out of eight tries.

St. Mary's led, 31-5, at the half and, obviously, the show was no fun for the gallery.

The SMA reserves racked up their sixth win, 44-8, over the Lynch B team. The Cards' third team got into this fracas and moved to an 18-8 halftime advantage. Lynch failed to score in the second half of the game. Gene O'Neill got 10 points for SMA; Larry Tomlinson, nine.

Burwell Downed in Seesaw Game

Four successful freethrows in the final 90 seconds of play, plus a timely bucket, turned a defeat into a victory for the O'Neill high Eagles Tuesday night at Burwell. Cunningham failed at the free-throw line for Burwell as the Longhorns were leading, 55-52, with 1 1/2 minutes remaining. O'Neill cleared the boards and sent Bob Porter on a drive for a quick bucket to narrow the margin to one point. Marvin Young intercepted a Burwell pitch and passed it to Jim Johnson, who was fouled. Johnson sank both freethrows to put O'Neill ahead, 56-55, with 30 seconds left to go.

Young was fouled in the closing seconds and cashed in on two more freethrows to ice the game.

The lead changed hands throughout with the Eagles spurring immediately before the half to gain a 33-25 halftime advantage.

The second half was only 90 seconds old before Burwell gained a 34-33 lead.

Burwell led at the first quarter, 15-14, and the score was tied at the third quarter, 46-46.

Young was high scorer for the evening with 17 points, besides being top rebounder for O'Neill.

Goodsell, a six-foot two-inch freshman, paced Burwell with 15 points.

O'Neill travels to Springfield Friday night and Neligh next Tuesday night.

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64-Page Farmers' Tax Guide Offered

The internal revenue service announces publication of a special booklet for the help of farmers who will be struggling with some unusual problems in preparing their 1955 income tax returns.

One million copies of the 64-page booklet, "Farmers' Tax Guide," have been printed. Farmers may get copies from their county agents, tax officials said.

The booklet deals with problems arising from the new social security act and with other subjects such as farm inventories, depreciation, capital gains and losses, casualty losses and thefts, trades, condemnations and displaced livestock and soil and water conservation.
