Tuesday, Jan. 24th Auction

Cattle receipts 741 head. Blowing and drifting snow kept consignors as well as out-state buyers away. However, there was sufficient buying power to absorb the cattle offering at largely steady prices. Butcher cattle was the only class to sell at a higher figure. Steer calves, 400 to 550 lbs., \$18.00 to \$21.00. Heifers, 375 to 500 lbs., \$15.50 to \$16.75. One load of good yearling steers sold at \$17.40 with the bulk of the yearlings at \$16.00 to \$18.00. Yearling heifers were in short supply with only one string of 48 head going at \$15.50 cwt. Breeding cows from \$10.00 to \$12.00, the latter price paid for the F. C. Watson Estate first calf heifers.

The lower cow grades were the ones showing the most advance with better cows largely unchanged with a week ago. Canner and cutter kinds from \$8.00 to \$9.00. Good cows, \$9.00 to \$9.75; better kinds from \$9.75 to \$10.75 cwt. Beef bulls, \$11.50 to \$13.25 cwt.
