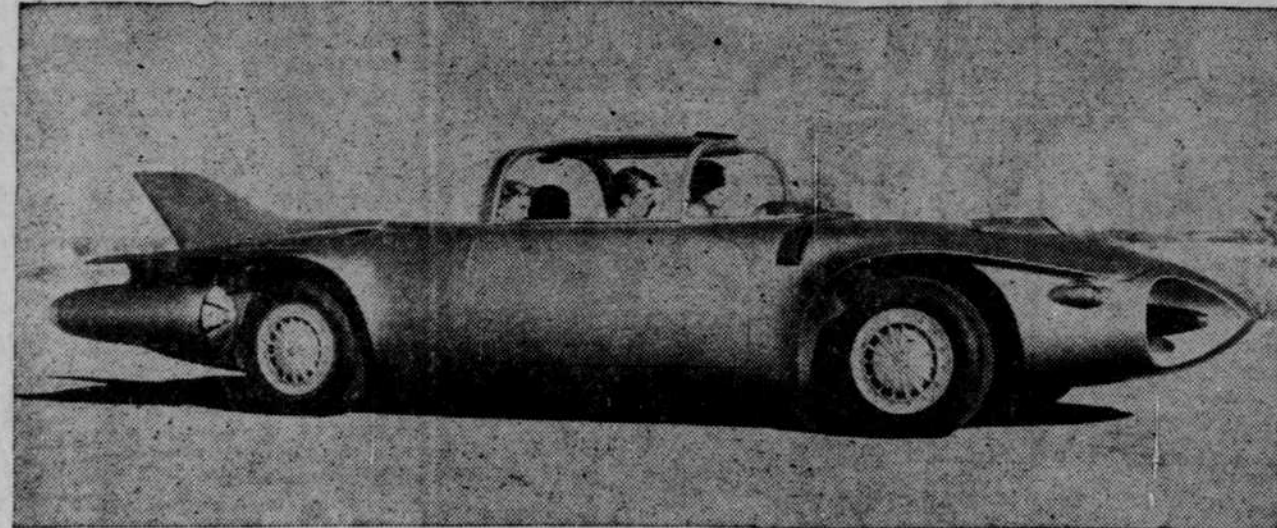
Christons Sell to Rotherhams

GM Unveils New Turbine Car



General Motors has built and successfully tested this new experimental gas turbine-powered car, Firebird II. To be shown publicly for the first time at the General Motors Motorama of 1956 in New York, Miami, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Boston, the Firebird II is designed as a four-passenger family car for highway use. General Motors has no plans, however, to put it into production.

Delayed Report on Ewing Death

EWING—A delayed report of the death of George O. Mitchell, 84, follows: Mr. Mitchell died December 3 at Ewing at the home of his sister, Mrs. Wilma Eppenbach. Funeral services were conducted from the United Presbyterian church with Rev. Lee Brigiden officiating. Burial was at Lennox, Ia., near the grave of his wife. George Orphious Mitchell was born May 9, 1871, near Mouth, Ill., the son of John S. and Mary Morton Mitchell. As a small boy he moved with his parents to Queen City, Ia., later to a farm nine miles east of Corning, Ia. He resided at Corning until February 9, 1898, when he married. His wife, the former Mary Ann Wood, died January 19, 1899. He came to Nebraska after his wife's death and later took a homestead near Yoder, Wyo. In 1930 he returned to Nebraska and made his home with his only sister, Mrs. Eppenbach, on the old farm northwest of Ewing. He was preceded in death by his wife, his parents, and one brother, Arthur.

'Gravy Train Gone,' Speaker Declares (Continued from page 1) braska. This weather today has been wonderful and no doubt responsible for this large crowd. "Not long ago I spoke to the Nebraska cattlemen at Alliance. I sympathize with their problems of lower cattle prices, but I told them they have been watching the tall end of the gravy train. I told them they had been living on it until a few years ago; they're off it now, and someone else is on it. "These things run in cycles. I think it's amazing we Americans don't throw up our hands in despair and give up. "Our job is to find a balance and get ourselves, our philosophy and our thinking straightened up. It's a tremendous job. "I'm wondering what my grandfather would say if he could come back and see one of our great four-lane super highways with cars whizzing by at 60-miles-per-hour, and big loads of wheat and cattle rolling at 50-miles-per-hour. "Here's what I think he would say: "There it is—but I don't believe it!"

'Thrift' Event Recalls Franklin A. L. Patton, owner of the Ben Franklin store at O'Neill, has announced his store is in a nationwide celebration of Benjamin Franklin's 250th birthday anniversary. The celebration takes the form of a "thrift week" sale event in the Ben Franklin store, and began last Thursday.

Mr. Patton explained that the local store is participating in this event as a member of a nationwide organization of over 2,400 independently owned Ben Franklin stores, named in honor of one of America's greatest patriots. It was Benjamin Franklin who, in 1754, first urged the colonies to unite to form this great nation. He immediately foresaw that greater things could be accomplished by the colonies working as a group as compared to each colony going its separate way.

Mr. Patton points out how this same philosophy is being successfully practiced today by the more than 2,400 Ben Franklin stores—working together as a united group—commanding far greater bargaining power in the buying market than any one individual could hope to possess. He adds, "Such a cooperative policy makes it possible for each independently owned Ben Franklin store to provide better service for the community it serves."
