Fair to good steers at \$15.00 to \$18.00 in weights of 500 to 550 lbs. Plainer cattle looked as much as 50 cents per hundred lower. All classes of canners, gutters and fat cows sold strong to 25 cents higher, in a range of \$9.00 to \$12.50 cwt.
