Mason Serves as First Chief Justice

Oliver P. Mason, the first man to serve as chief justice of the supreme court of the state of Nebraska, was appointed to fill the vacancy created when Wil-liam A. Little, who had been elected to the office in 1866,

Judge Mason presided over the supreme court during the difficult days when Governor Butler was impeached, and when many cases arising out of that difficulty and the problem of organizing a new state had to be decided.

Following his retirement from the court, Judge Mason entered the practice of law in Lincoln, in which he was eminently successful. Though always active in the affairs of the republican party, he did not again run for public office.
