Goodwill Group to Make 5 Stops

Omahans to Travel in Special Train

Representatives of 72 Omaha business firms will visit five Holt county communities on Friday, May 14, as members of the annual goodwill tour sponsored by the Omaha Chamber of Commerce.

Chairman Fred Pfaff advised The Frontier the goodwillers will arrive in O'Neill from the west aboard a special Chicago & North Western railroad train, reaching here at 10:50 a.m., after having spent the night at Long Pine.

First stop after leaving Long Pine will be at Bassett at 8:20 a.m.; Newport, 8:55 a.m.; Stuart, 9:20 a.m.; Atkinson, 9:55 a.m.

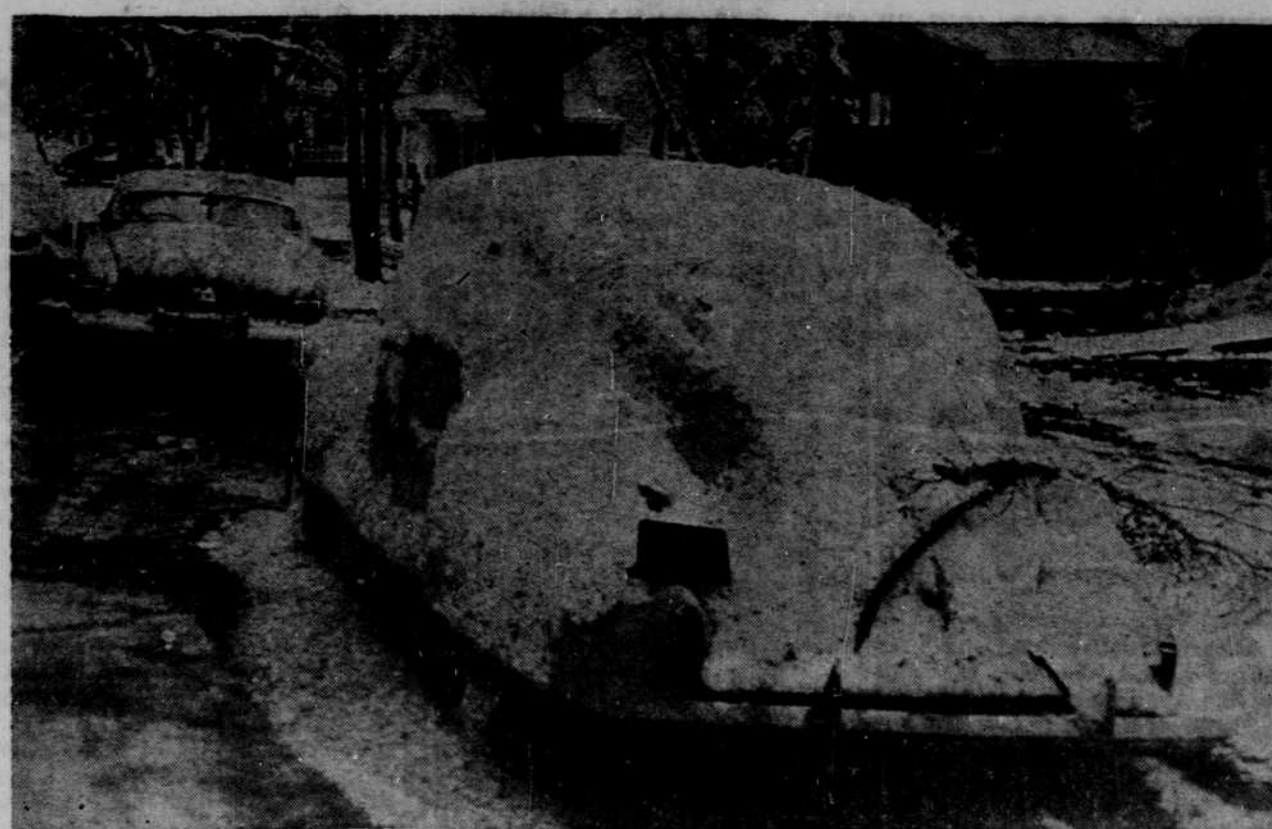
Leaving O'Neill following a 45-minute stop, the Omahans will reach Inman at 11:45 a.m.; Ewing, 12:15 p.m.; Clearwater, 12:45 p.m.—winding up at Norfolk at 4 o'clock.

The goodwillers are on a 1,500-mile tour of western and northern Nebraska and the Black Hills region of South Dakota. In most towns, including O'Neill, the trip-takers will parade. In others, time will not permit a march through town; but at every stop, they will distribute candy and balloons to the children, and Dan Desdune's Land, directed by George Bryant, will play for the townspeople.

"To supply the demand," Mr. Pfaff said, "we are leaving Omaha with 3,500 pounds of salt water taffy kisses and 70,000 balloons. We hope none of the children will be disappointed."

During the six-day trip, scheduled May 9-15, the special train carrying the Omahans will visit 62 towns with a total population of more than 140,000.

The first good-will tour by Omaha businessmen was sponsored in 1889 by the Omaha board of trade. Because more than one trip a year used to be made, it is estimated that more than 80 such trips have been conducted during the past 65 years.
