Long distance telephone circuits were knocked out late Saturday and partial service was restored about 8 o'clock Sunday night. In the meantime O'Neil and surrounding communities were virtually isolated from the outside world.

Many side roads were blocked or nigh impassable because of the snow and rain. Consumers Public Power district experienced interruptions in delivering service to Page, Inman and Ewing. Falling trees were the chief source of trouble.
