Class C Champions Score in State

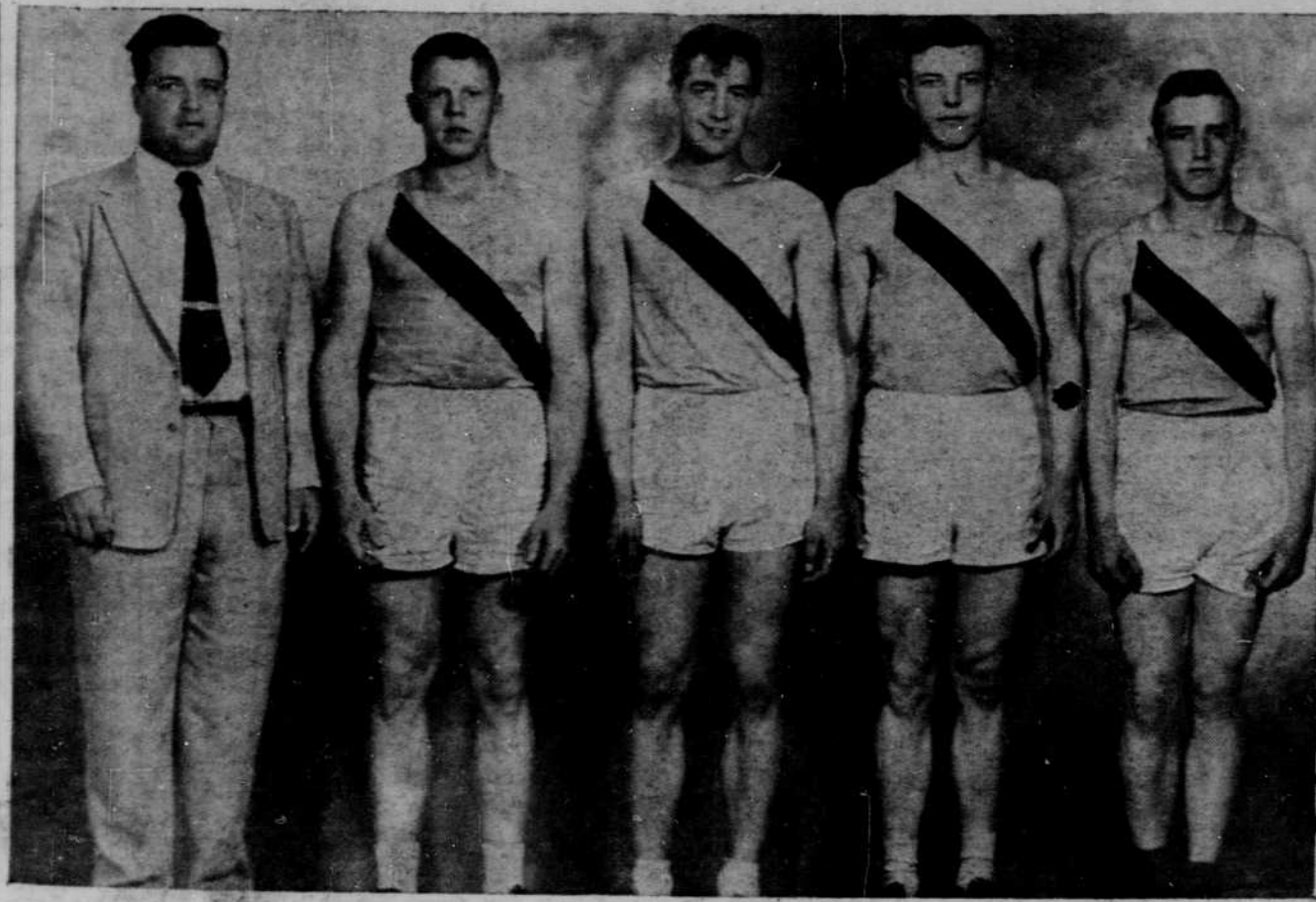
EWING — The Ewing high school Tigers' four-man track team, champions of the district class C tourney at Norfolk, competed during the weekend in the state track and field carnival at Lincoln. The Tigers scored two points.

The team includes Keith Gibson, Melvin Pruden, Dorrence Hobbs and Bob Hobbs. The coach is Richard ("Dick") Lane.

At Norfolk, Gibson qualified in the 220-yard dash and discus. Pruden qualified in the 440. Dorrence Hobbs and Bob Hobbs joined Gibson and Pruden in making up the 880-yard relay team, which also qualified for state competition.

Others on the track team are Francis Huemesser, mile; Walter Hand, discus and high jump; Jack Sisson, Bob and Gene Koenig, Leo Spes, mile relay.

The trophy won at Norfolk was the first bagged in a number of years for the Tigers.

Larry Chace, senior speedster, was in a photo-finish for honors in the 220-yard race, finishing second. Chace ranked fifth in the 100-yard dash.

The O'Neill 880-yard relay team placed second. The team consists of Dick Gaskill, Larry McConnell, Don Davidson and Chace.

Duane Booth rated fourth in the 12-pound shotput.

To Give Bedspreed —

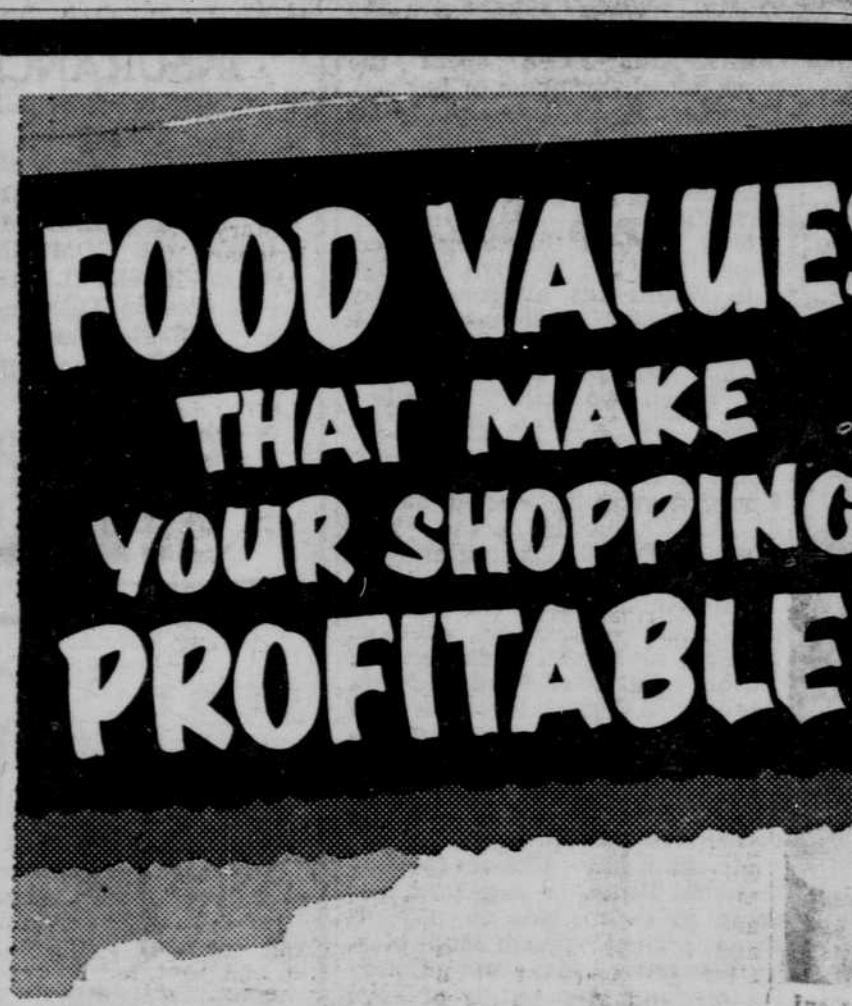
