"Today we pay tribute to Mrs. Krotter. Honor is due her and we wish to show our appreciation and our gratitude for the gift this organ, she has presented to the church," Mrs. Olday said.

"Her gift is not surprising. Haven't she given the best years of her life in filling her place at the organ or piano for church and Sunday-school?"

"Sixty years is a long time to always be found at her post, whatever the occasion. Now, as years have made it impossible for her to attend church, she has given this organ for younger hands to play."

"Mrs. Krotter made her first public appearance in a little country church near Ocheyedan, Ia., where she played on a reed organ variations of the hymn 'In the Sweet Bye and Bye.'"

"She is nearing her 80th birthday anniversary and who wouldn't say she has done her bit, although she is still doing many acts of kindness helping those less fortunate than herself?" Mrs. Olday concluded.
