

High Wind Causes Damage at Ewing Chimney Knocked Off, Lands Upright

EWING—A windstorm struck Ewing between 8 and 9 o'clock Sunday evening. Considerable damage was done to a large front window at the American Legion club and a smaller one at the entrance of Curly's store.

The chimney on the kitchen of the Lee Spittler home was taken off neatly and landed upright in the yard. No other damage was done about the home.

Uprooted trees and broken branches were evidence of the wind in other sections of the town. The electricity went off during the storm and homes were in darkness until about 6 o'clock. A small amount of rain fell.

At the Victor Vandernick home, southwest of Ewing, a windmill tower was wrecked, trees uprooted, the milk house and a hog house were damaged.

Some damage was also reported at the following farm homes: Charles Spangler, Stanley Huffman and Louis Pofahl.

The REA service was interrupted and not resumed until Monday afternoon.

The mail carrier found it difficult to cover his route in this area due to fallen trees blocking the road.
