

Scientists and astronomers all ever the world had Holt county pinpointed on their maps and charts as the central point of the starting front of this spectacular eclipse of the sun. The front, which extended from three miles west of the Cumminsville corner to a point
12 miles north of Bassett, was
the beginning of the path of totality. The blackout moved from
Holt county to Lake Superior,
Greenland, Norway, Sweden,
Kussia and Pakistan, India.

As the eclipse began a pale

As the eclipse began, a pale purple covering spread over the landscape and rapidly moved northward, moving at approximately 3,000mph. Just 2 hours and 45 minutes after the eclipse began in Holt county, a black sun set in Jodpur, India. The eclipse, however, did not bring total darkness. The sun's corona or halo appeared outside the shadow of the moon, and around the rim of the sun were red, jet-like tongues of incandescent hy-drogen gas which are usually in-

The eclipse, which was total only 90 seconds, was partial and clearly visible for much longer. Other parts of the nation got at least a partial glimpse of the eclipse—New York City saw 74 percent of the sun covered; Chi-

One important project is to use the eclipse to learn more acurately distances between North America and Europe, The exact instant of totality will be timed at sites established in North America, Europe and the East. Since the speed of the moon's shadow is known, distances between the continents can be measured with great accuracy.

Here in O'Neill and surrounding territories residents gave the rising sun a good audience. Spectators were on hand at the O'-Neill airport to view the spectacle, and a number of persons traveled to a hilltop located seven miles north of O'Neill. Both sites gave a good and unob-structed view. Many people who didn't journey to a hilltop to watch viewed the eclipse from their bedroom window or lawn.
