

age 6 weeks, were returning to their home in Lincoln after hav-ing spent the Fourth of July weekend with relatives in O'-Neill.


Mrs. Wells said she was driving the car and lost control when the machine struck a rut in the road. As the car went into the ditch, the door opened and Mr. Wells fell out.




