The altar was appointed with baskets of white gladioli and cathedral candles. White satin streamers of gladioli decorated the pews.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, chose a bouffant waltz-length princess style gown of white shantung taffeta. The brief sleeves fell from a high Elizabethan shawl collar that was edged in seed pearls. She also wore short taffeta mitts buttoned around the wrists. We discussed plans for going to the fun festival at Stuart where we placed third. On Friday, August 6, we held a special meeting for the girls' style review and room improvement lessons.

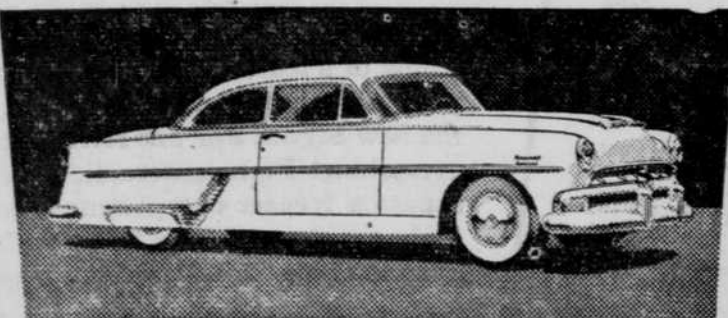

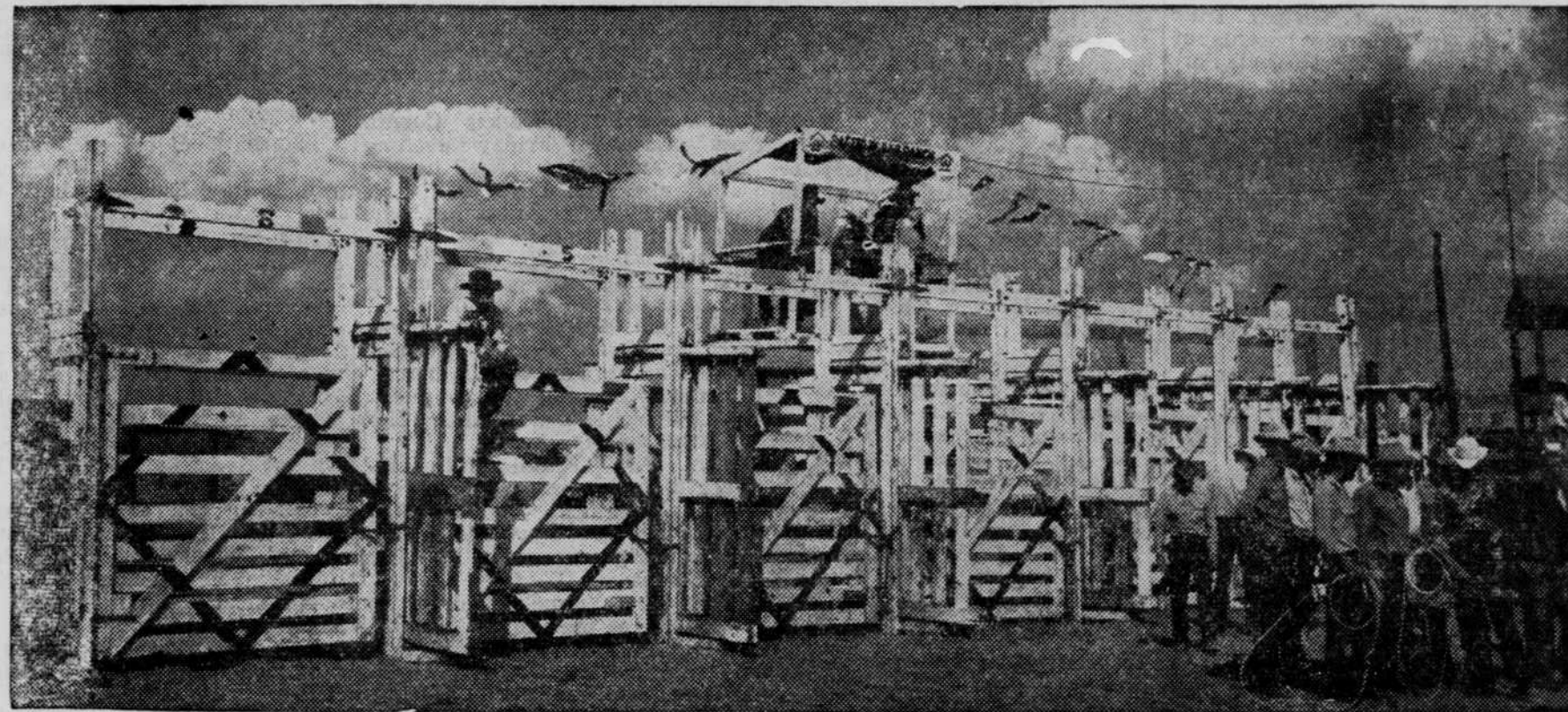
