Mr. and Mrs. Otto Reimer of Lincoln spent the labor day holiday with relatives here.



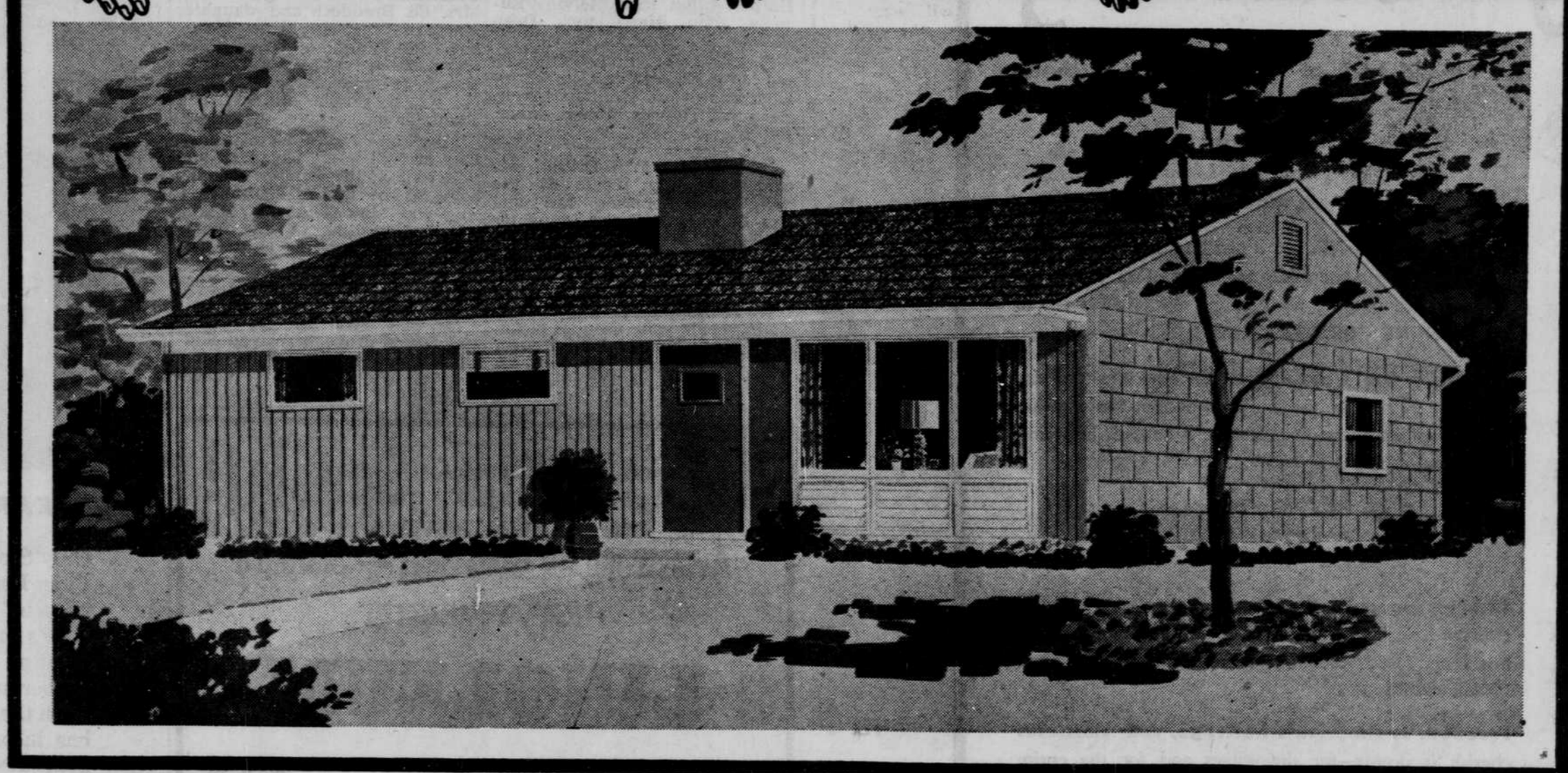
