Finally Living Close to School

Some mothers overdo the peanut butter sandwich business in school lunches, and their school fry get so tired of the same old tip? If your children are fond of peanut butter, vary the combinations and they won't get monotonous so quickly. Here are some variations you'll want to try out:

PEANUT BUTTER AND CREAM CHEESE
 Blend 1/2 cup peanut butter, one 3-ounce package cream cheese, two tablespoons milk and a generous sprinkling of salt. Makes four full sized sandwiches.

PEANUT BUTTER AND TOMATO
 Blend 1/4 cup of peanut butter with two tablespoons mayonnaise. Spread on two slices of bread, and then top with a bread slice. Makes two full sized sandwiches.

PEANUT BUTTER AND BACON
 Blend 1/2 cup peanut butter with 1/4 cup cooked minced bacon. Makes three full sized sandwiches.

PEANUT BUTTER AND WATERCRESS
 Blend 1/4 cup peanut butter with two tablespoons mayonnaise. Spread on two slices of bread. Top each with four to five sprigs of watercress and then top with bread slice. Makes two full sized sandwiches.

PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY
 Spread peanut butter on one slice of bread and jelly on the other. A tart jelly like grape or currant gives the best flavor.

PEANUT BUTTER AND CHILI SAUCE
 Blend 1/4 cup peanut butter with two tablespoons chili sauce, two tablespoons milk and a generous sprinkling of salt. Makes three full sized sandwiches.

I got my plants from a greenhouse and the old gentleman gave me some yellow ones. I just wish you could eat some of the tomatoes, they are ever so good.

I have been very busy canning the past few days. Mother and I had some of our own corn and beans. Every thing we can is a help on this cost of living.

The two oldest children are going to school in Butte and the two little children started to school on September 7. We live about a half mile from school so they are home for dinner at noon. We have always lived so far from school before that they really enjoy being able to come home for lunch.

Do you or any of your readers have a good apple butter recipe, also one for tomato preserves? I had the chance to put up a lot of sweet and dill pickles this year. I tried watermelon pickles, too, for the first time so I wonder how they will taste this winter.

Well, this is plenty long so I will send a recipe or two along. I enjoy your column so very much.

BEST RELISH
 Four cups chopped cooked beets, four cups chopped cabbage, 1 1/2 cups grated horseradish, two cups vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, one cup sugar.

Combine beets, cabbage, horseradish, salt and pepper. Scald vinegar, dissolve sugar in it, and add to vegetable mixture. Cook until vegetables are done. Seal in hot sterile jars. Makes about five pints.

CUSTARD ICE CREAM
 Beat two eggs until well blended, add six tablespoons of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Heat two cups milk in double boiler. Add a small amount of egg mixture at a time to avoid lumping. Cook until custard coats the spoon. Be careful not to over-cook or this will curdle the custard. Remove from fire and chill as fast as possible. Add a teaspoon of vanilla and 1 1/2 of evaporated milk or heavy cream. (Mrs. Menkens doesn't say if she means cups when she says 1 1/2.)

Requested Recipe—
 Here is the apple butter recipe which your editor has requested.

QUICK APPLE BUTTER
 Five pounds (10) apples, three cups water, one 3/4 ounce box powdered fruit pectin, one teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon allspice, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, four drops red food coloring, seven cups sugar.

Wash, quarter and core the apples. Add water and cook until tender. Put through food mill or coarse sieve. Add powdered fruit pectin, spices and red coloring. Heat to boiling. Stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil. Cook two minutes, stirring constantly. Skim, pour into hot sterilized jars and seal. Makes four pints.
