Increased Planting Flexibility Sought
 Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson recently announced that total acreage allotments would be removed from the farm program for the 1955 crop year in order to permit increased flexibility in planting schedules. Another change announced was that smaller wheat plantings — not more than 15 acres — are excepted from the cross-compliance provisions of the farm program. This means that if producers fail to comply with wheat allotments which are under this "15 acre" figure, they will not be eligible for wheat price support, according to William Miller of the Holt county ASC office.
