Cardinals Finally Taste Victory, 25-6

Lynch No Match for St. Mary's

The St. Mary's Cardinals broke into the win column last Thursday afternoon for the first time in two seasons with a convincing 25-6 victory over Lynch. Their victory came as the result of headsup football. The Cardinals recovered five fumbles, intercepted two passes and blocked a punt.

Gary Holly gave warning of what was to come as he took the ball on a neatly executed hidden ball play and scampered 65 yards for a touchdown in the opening minutes of the game. Evidently the play was too well executed, the officials failed to see the ball, and they called back the long run.

Terry Wanser then took over and punched across the first touchdown of the afternoon on a 7-yard run. He followed it up by plunging for the extra point.

Tommy Head lost little time in adding to the St. Mary's total, recovering a fumble in the end zone, and the Cardinals led 13-0

at half time.

Wanser widened the margin early in the third period when he pirated a Lynch pass and ran 25 yards to score. Terry did some nice stepping in this run, shaking loose from three different tacklers. Head then added the final touchdown when he went 7 yards behind perfect blocking to score standing up. The academy led 25-6 at the end of three quarters.

Vicious tackling by Schneider, Donlin, Hynes and Weiler kept the Lynch attack bottled up until late in the final period when the Lynch footballers secured their one tally. Holly and Schaffer each contributed long runs to add to the Cardinals' cause.

The Cardinals go up against the number 3 six-man team in the state tonight (Thursday) as they journey to Norfolk to play Sacred Heart.

"The Cardinals are up for this game and hope to upset the dopsters, now that they have learned what a victory feels like," Coach Don Templemeyer explained.
