## Young Cards Sparkle Despite 59-18 Loss Frosh Back Accounts for 2 TD's

The St. Mary's academy Cardinals, playing their best game of the season against the stiffest in six-man grid circles in the state, threw a scare into the highly-touted Sacred Heart Knights at Norfolk last Thursday evening. Sacred Heart won, 59-18.

The Cardinals received and organized a good drive when a bad pitchout went screwy and forced them to punt. The Norfolkans took over but lost possession on a fumble. Schneider recovering for the Cardinals.

Two running plays set the Redbirds back eight yards. Wanser hit Schaffer with a pass for five yards and Gary Holly, a frosh back, scampered 23 yards on the fourth down to score.

Sacred Heart retaliated quickly, knotting the count at 6-6. Lawler turned in a nice run and the Norfolk parochial kids went ahead 14-6 at the quarter.

St. Mary's drove 61 yards for the Cardinals' second TD with Schneider rambling the final 17 yards on a double-reverse. Not a knight laid a mitt on him.

The Cardinals connected on two long passes and forged a 27-12 halftime lead.

The roof then fell in on the Cardinals in the third. Unable to muster a substantial offensive drive, the academy then dropped behind 45-12 at the end of three periods.

The final quarter found the Cardinals once again running in high gear, driving nicely for their third and final TD with Gary Holly going 15 yards to score and bringing the score to 45-18.

The Knights returned the kickoff to the Cardinals' 22 and went

on to score, boosting the count to 52-18.

A Cardinal drive was halted on the 2-yard line and in the closing minutes, Lawler of Sacred Heart pirated a Cardinal desperation pass and scooted 12 yards to the final touchdown.

Inability to stop the Knights' long passes was the downfall of the Cardinals. They were able to hold the Sacred Hearts backs to 175 yards rushing compared to their own 149, but fell short of matching the Knights' 144 yards by passing, although they did connect on 12 out of 20 for 91 yards.

Loss of David Schaffer, first string quarterback, early in the first half slowed the Cardinal offense though Max Bohn did a fine job quarterbacking for his first game of the year.

## Cards Hand Hawks 2nd Loss of Season—

St. Mary's Cardinals handed the high-flying Verdigré Hawks their second defeat of the season, 28-18, Wednesday afternoon. October 27, at Verdigré.

Donlin got the ball rolling by recovering the opening kickoff on the 29. Four plays later, Wanser hit pay dirt from the 9. Jim Froelich punched over the extra point, putting St. Mary's ahead 7-0 with a minute and a half gone.

Verdigré struck back with a 49-yard pass play, good for a TD. Try for extra point failed.

The Cardinals drove back for their second TD with Tom Head taking a pass from Wanser and going eight yards. St. Mary's led at the quarter, 13-6.

The Cardinals added three insurance points early in the second period when Jim Hickey tackled a Verdigré call carrier in the endzone for a safety. Half time score read St. Mary's 16, Verdigré 6.

St. Mary's lost little time in striking for the third touchdown in the third quarter. Head returned the kickoff 63 yards to Verdigré's 12.

On the first scrimmage play, Froelich wheeled around right end for 12 yards to the TD, making the count 22-6.

Denny Tornik put Verdigré back in the game with two lightning touchdown thrusts of 57 and 42 yards. He pulled up 18-22.

St. Mary's took over in the final quarter, consistently threatening only to have penalties stop three touchdown drives.

Verdigré, unable to reach the line of scrimmage, offered little in the way of offense in the last quarter. Froelich drove five yards for the final score of the game, St. Mary's winning 28-18.

Hard tackling by the defensive team, composed of Donlin, Schneider, Hynes, Weier, Head and Enright, held the Verdigré offense down.

The Cardinals were without the services of their first string quarterback, David Schaffer, injured in the Sacred Heart game, and Gary Holly, first string end, who was injured in a hunting accident.

## Outweighed Broncos No Match for Ewing

STUART—The Stuart high Broncos dropped a football game to the Ewing Tigers, 44-0, on the Stuart grid Friday night.

Stuart's small club showed the type of courageous fight it has been exhibiting all season in the first half but the big, poised Ewing club simply overpowered the Broncos in the last half.

Giving away about 30 pounds per man, Stuart battled Ewing to the wire in the first half. Ewing scored in the second quarter and lead 6-0, but Stuart moved well and was on the Ewing 8 with three minutes left when a Stuart field pass was intercepted by Carl and he raced 90 yards to break the Broncos. Ewing led 12-0 at half time.

The second half was strictly no contest as Sisson, Gibson and Carl ran at will.

Stuart's small but aggressive line was worn completely down and Coach Hermance substituted frequently, giving underclassmen valuable experience. The game was marred by numerous penalties.

All of Ewing's team played a fine game while Hytrek and Sophomore Del Stracke picked up a great deal of yardage through the air for Stuart.

## O'Neill Eagles Shine at Neligh

### Bring Back Trophy for 27-19 Win

O'Neill high annexed its second win in six starts Friday night, triumphing over the Neligh Warriors at Neligh. The victory starts the Blues off on the right foot toward claiming permanent possession of the traveling trophy.

The Frontier and The Neligh News provide a trophy which must be won three consecutive years for permanent possession.

For several campaigns the trophy was passed back-and-forth between the two ancient rivals, but the Eagles won over the Warriors in 1951, 1952 and 1953 to make a permanent home for the crown.

The trophy presented Friday night is a new one.

O'Neill's scoring was accomplished like this:

Eddie Gatz scored from the Neligh 6-yard line through the line. Gatz tallied TD number 2 on a scamper from the 49, circling his own right end. Two extra points were added by Duane Alton, cracking the Warrior line.

The Eagles racked up 14 points during the initial period.

In the third stanza, Alton bucked across from the 1-foot line, going over his own right tackle. Bob Sanders scored the extra point on an end-around.

In the final quarter Sanders scored from the Neligh 9 on an end-around.

Outstanding for the Blues were Alton, Gatz, Sanders and Bailey; for Neligh, Ganskow and Anderson.

Skeeter Mahler, Neligh sopho quarterback, passed to Anderson, who ran to Neligh's first TD.

Neligh tallied another touchdown when Anderson raked up gains of 20 and 26 yards and then scored from the O'Neill 9.

Several Neligh regulars rode the bench during the evening for disciplinary reasons.
