**Fuller Use of Robinson Planned**

Plans for a fuller multiple use of Ft. Robinson were advanced at a conference Monday in Lincoln. The 22,000-acre property in northwestern Nebraska, part of which is being used currently for beef breeding research, also has recreational and historical possibilities, the conferees agreed.

The next step will be a survey to ascertain which parts of the property should be set aside for recreational purposes, and what can be done toward exploiting the historical background of the area.

Representatives of the University of Nebraska, game commission, historical department and state resources division met with members of a legislative committee Monday.

**Hunters Will Get Questionnaires**

LINCOLN—Over seven thousand Nebraska waterfowl hunters will receive hunting success questionnaires at the end of the current duck and goose season. The questionnaires are being sent out in a cooperative program with other states in the Central Flyway by the Nebraska game, forestation and parks commission.

The Central Flyway council, made up by member game commissions in the Central Flyway, will use this information for making recommendations to the fish and wildlife service for the 1955 waterfowl season.

Hunters are asked by game commission spokesmen to list on the questionnaires their hunting success, the kinds of birds bagged and the number of times they went hunting. After the questionnaires are returned to the cooperating states, a good estimate of the over-all flyway harvest can be determined.

All hunters receiving such questionnaires are asked to fill them out and return them as soon as possible.

Results of the survey, coupled with other surveys made at a later date, give a good picture of the duck and goose populations and make it possible for the Central Flyway council to make tangible management recommendations.

**Chances Better Chances Better to Get**

LINCOLN—State Resources Division Chief C. V. Price said Tuesday removal of restrictions on commercial vegetable planting, as announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, answers a major question in proposed location of a soup canning plant in Nebraska.

Before the change in regulations, Nebraska farmers would have been unable to raise vegetables commercially if they wished to be eligible for price supports on corn or wheat. The provision had discouraged many farmers from becoming interested in vegetable raising.

A large canning company which had expressed interest in the possibility of a plant in this state would need assurance of 6,000 acres of tomatoes.

With the change in federal regulations, Price figures Nebraska's chances of getting the plant are "one out of two or three."

Missouri also is bidding for the plant.
