Million Dollar Error at Garrison

The Missouri river division of the corps of engineers at Omaha said that an error of approximately one million dollars by the apparent low bidder has forced rejection of all bids on a Garrison, N.D., dam project.

The bid opening for work on the stage two spillway at the dam by the engineers' Garrison district office in Riverdale, N.D., showed the combine of Peter Kiewit Sons Construction Co. of Omaha and Morrison-Knudsen Co. of Boise, Ida., to be the apparent low bidder.

However, the combine said that an error had been made in its original estimate of \$6,159,006. The problem was referred to the division office at Omaha.

Another bid opening will be held by the Garrison district office on February 1.
