Emmet Firemen Put Down Threat

EMMET — A fire, which was started accidentally Monday forenoon by some burning paper, was extinguished by the men of Emmet before doing serious damage. Burning paper was blown from a barrel in which Mrs. Robert Cole was burning trash. It ignited dry weeds along the Guy Cole pasture just east of Emmet, burned along the road north and a little east until it reached the old highway before it was put out. It burned across the G. Owen Cole yard but missed the residence.

O'Neill firemen were called. The O'Neill number two truck set out for Emmet but the fire-fighters were intercepted and told to return before reaching the scene.

Scores of round bales of hay were destroyed.

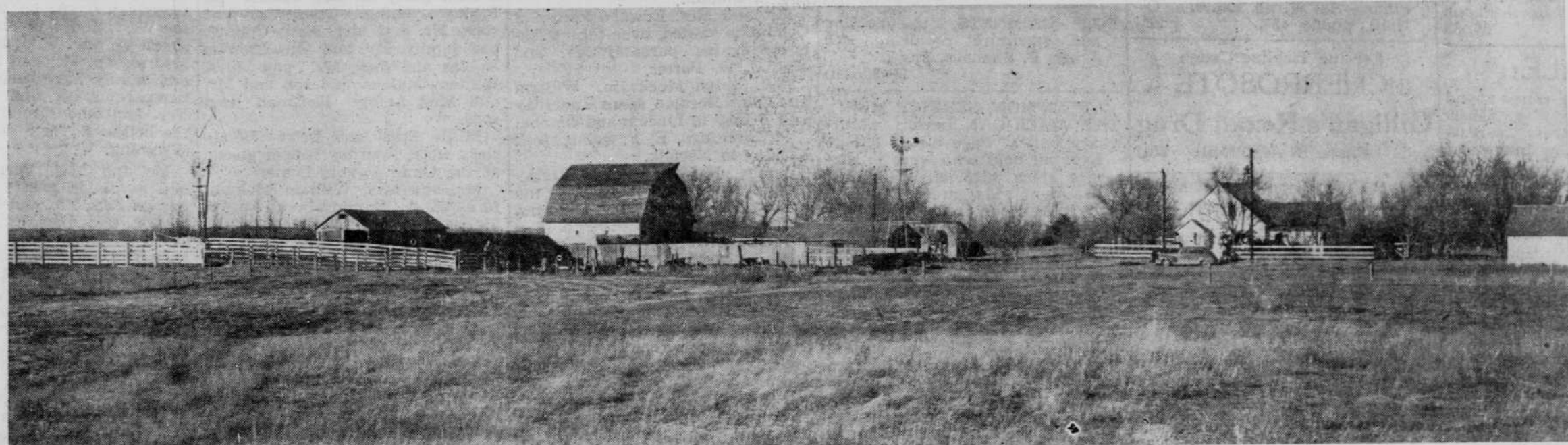

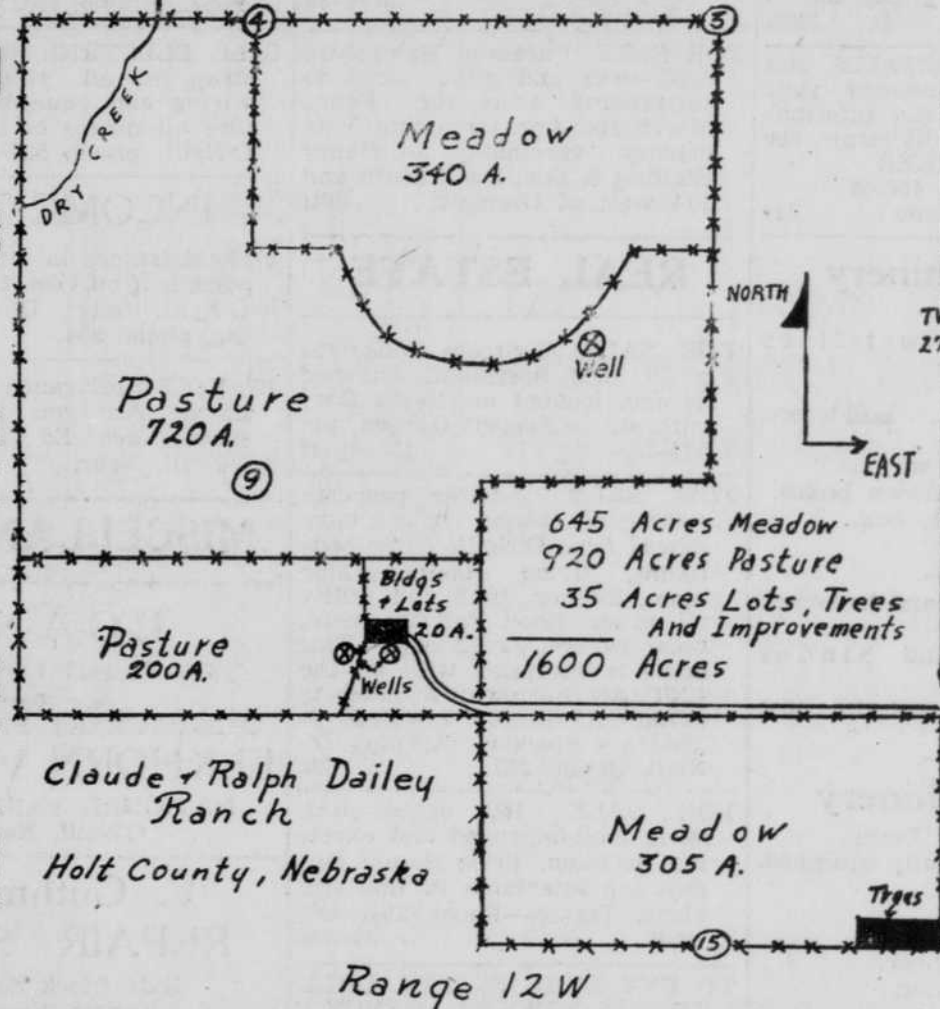
