### Holsclaw Draws Madrid Assignment

Frederick B. Holsclaw of Kansas City, Mo., son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Holsclaw of O'Neill, will be assigned to the American embassy at Madrid, Spain, effective March 1. Mr. Holsclaw has been chief maintenance inspector for the civil aeronautics administration at Kansas City. Mr. Holsclaw's wife and their children will remain in Kansas City until after the school term is completed. Meanwhile, he will make housing arrangements at Madrid. His parents will leave O'Neill tentatively on Monday, for a visit with Frederick and his family. When 18-years-old, Frederick acquired a wide reputation for his ability to handle coded messages and has been with the CAA a number of years. His Madrid assignment comes under the foreign overseas administration and his duties will be to teach radio and radar to the Spanish in government work there.

State Sen. Frank Nelson, O'Neill farmer and veteran member of the unicameral legislature from the Twenty-eighth district (Holt, Rock, Boyd and Keya Paha counties), has been made chairman of the agriculture session, which convened last week.
