A feature attraction of over 300 Angus breeding cows sold from 140.00 to 171.00 a head for commercial cows, while some 50 head of registered cows sold from 175.00 to 250.00 a head. Cows and butcher cattle sold 25 to 50 cents better than a week ago.
