Sorin Brilliant Young Pianist



Samuel Sorin . . . schedules O'Neill concert.

In Samuel Sorin, brilliant young American pianist, who will appear here on Thursday, February 3, at the O'Neill public school auditorium, are combined a virtuoso technique with a profound musicianship and deep artistic integrity. Sorin's appearance here will be the second attraction in the Community Concert series.

After a Sorin performance with the Philadelphia orchestra in New York's Carnegie hall, Virgil Thomson, critic of the New York Herald-Tribune, wrote: "His are a master's technique and a first-class tone. Beyond his technical excellence, which is tops, I found his music-making completely interesting to listen to."

Sorin's musicianship has won him an enviable list of engagements and re-engagements with important symphony orchestras throughout the country. Orchestras which have presented this brilliant young virtuoso are the (Chautauqua N.Y.) Symphony, Kansas City (Mo.) Philharmonic, Carnegie Pops Orchestra of New York City, and orchestras in Houston, Tex., Detroit, Mich., Baltimore, Md., Seattle, Wash., and Portland, Ore. This season he is adding the Rochester (N.Y.) Philharmonic, Washington's National Gallery orchestra and a return engagement with the Baltimore symphony to the already long list.

In recital, Sorin has enjoyed similar success. He has toured the continent from Newfoundland to Central America.

The young man who counts these among his achievements is a native of Detroit. He began studying piano at the age of six. At 12 he began a prize-winning streak by winning a grand piano in the greater Detroit competition. Scholarships carried him first to Chicago, Ill., to study, then to New York's Juilliard school of music. For three seasons, he toured with mounting prestige, appearing in recital and as soloist with orchestra.

After three years of wartime service in the army, the young pianist decided to undertake a period of reevaluation and reeducation. For two years he devoted himself to intensive study in order to broaden the base of his music and to penetrate more deeply into the inner meanings of music. As a result, he is today not only an artist whose technical agility is literally all-embracing in its scope but also an artist in the true sense of the word who has the magical ability to shed new light on a masterpiece. For in Sorin the notes have marched off the paper and have come alive in his heart and head.

Sorin is married to the former Edith Wise of Calgary, Alb., Can. Mrs. Sorin is a pianist of note herself and is a member of the staff of the Juilliard school where she was a pupil. The Sorins make their home in New York. On May 26, 1951, a potential new Sorin virtuoso, Kathryn Lynn, made her debut.
