#### Crispy Stuffed Acorn Squash



A familiar vegetable favorite, acorn squash, comes all dressed up as a main course for winter meals in a brand-new version that's as tasty as it is nourishing. This tangy meal-in-itself dish—Crispy Stuffed Acorn Squash—is a real homemaker's delight for satisfying even the heartiest cold-weather appetite in the family. Its delicious stuffing combines chopped ham, onion, and green pepper with coarsely crushed Krispy cracker crumbs for extra good flavor and texture interest. Here's the easy way to make it:

Crispy Stuffed Acorn Squash

2 medium-sized acorn squash 14 cup butter or margarine Dash salt and pepper ½ cup minced onion 4 cup minced green pepper 1 cup finely chopped ready-to-eat ham

2 cups coarsely crushed Sunshine Krispy cracker crumbs ½ teaspoon dry mustard ¾ teaspoon salt Second dash pepper 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco

4 teaspoons flour 1 cup milk Cut squash in half and remove seeds. Brush hollow portion with melted butter or margarine. Sprinkle with salt and pepper; cover with aluminum foil and bake at 400°F. for 45 minutes, or until squash is tender. Meanwhile, sauté onion and green pepper in 1 tablespoon of the butter until tender-crisp, but not browned. In medium-sized bowl, combutter until tender-crisp, but not browned. In medium-sized bowl, combine onion mixture, ham, cracker crumbs, mustard, ¾ teaspoon salt, pepper and Tabasco. Toss to blend. In same skillet in which onion was sautéed, heat 1 tablespoon of the butter and stir in combined flour and milk. Cook, stirring, until smooth and thickened. Pour over cracker mixture and blend well. Stuff into cavities in halved squah and drizzle remaining butter over the top. Continue to bake for 15 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes 4 servings.
