

Holt Champs Cop, 83-81, in Overtime

Bobby Reimers Hits 30-Point Clip

PAGE—The Inman high Tigers, 1955 Holt county cage champions, were extended into an overtime period Friday night by the Page Eagles before winning, 83-81. Hugh Troshynski sent the frenzied affair into the extra period when he sank one of two charity tosses. But Inman's sharp-shooting Bobby Reimers emerged as the hero when he connected with two freethrows at the crucial moment. Reimers' 30 points and Gene Couch's 29 tallies were best individual performances although Dynamite Hugh rolled up 28. Inman led all the way—21-18 at the first quarter mark; 38-33 at halftime, and 59-52 going into the final period. The score was deadlocked—74-all—at the end of the regular playing time. The preliminary game found Page reserves defeating Inman, 40-35.

In a grade team contest at Inman on Wednesday afternoon, February 2, the Inman team walloped the Page club, 42-27. After a good first half showing by both teams, the host club spurred. Appleby of Inman led all scorers with 21 points. Ickes with 10 led Page.

SPENCER—The St. Mary's academy Cardinals of O'Neill needed an extra inning Tuesday night to down the Butte Wildcats in the initial game of the Niobrara Valley conference tournament. The O'Neill parochial team won it, 53-52. In the second game, Lynch won an air-tight game from the Verdigre Hawks, 45-43.

Off to a fast start, the Cardinals went ahead of Butte, 14-8, in the first period. Tommy Head hit three out of six field tries and Terry Wanser bagged three out of five—all from outside the circle. The Cards continued their long-range bombardment through the second period with Dave Schaffer adding a couple of post shots to additional tallies by Head and Wanser.

The Butte 'Cats roared back in the second half after trailing 22-30 at intermission. They reduced the margin to 34-38 during the third canto.

Hoffman was the big gun for Butte in the second-half flurry, getting seven long set shots. Butte tied it 40-all. Then it was anybody's game.

Head's Hits Clincher in Final Seconds

Coach Don Templemeyer's St. Mary's academy Cardinals came from behind in the closing minutes to edge St. Joseph's hall of Atkinson, 41-40, in a thrill-a-second contest Friday night on the O'Neill court. The Cards originally were to have entertained St. Ludger's academy of Creighton, but the Knox countyans were wary of the snow and wind.

Both the Cards and the Josies got off to a slow start in Friday's go, garnering six points each in the opening period. The Hilltoppers moved ahead, 19-16, at the half-way mark, chiefly on the accuracy of Terry Wanser, who potted four fielders during the first half.

Dave Schaffer hit three consecutive pivot shots in the third and the O'Neill Irish maintained a three-point lead at the end of the stanza.

St. Joe roared back strong in the fourth and momentarily grabbed a five-point bulge. The Cards were trailing 38-40 with two minutes remaining, the Josies stalled. Wanser intercepted with 40 seconds left. With 25 seconds to go, Schaffer was fouled. He dropped the two gratis tosses to knot the issue. Tommy Head got into the heroic column by intercepting in midcourt and driving for the bucket, only to be fouled in the process. He missed the first freethrow try, connected with the second. St. Mary's was out in front, 41-40, with 15 frenzied seconds remaining.

The Josies were unable to un-cork a shot as three jump balls chewed up the clock.

Schaffer's 14 points and Wanser's 13 paced the Cardinals. Head accumulated eight. Jerry Cuddy and Jim Froelich showed well in ball handling. The Josies relied chiefly on the fast break.

The Josie seconds won a prelim, 38-29, avenging an earlier loss to the Cardinal underlings. Jim Becker hit seven points for SMA.


