The "Air de Lia" from "L' Enfant Prodigue" by Claude Debussy, the French originator of musical impressionism. In all Debussy's works, he veils form with a blending of tonal combinations as original as they are beautiful. With Theresa Green's aesthetic voice quality, the aria was a successful finis to the

impressionistic group. In concluding her concert, the artist sang a group of folk songs. She sang them in tones of beauty and pathos difficult to equal. The highlight of these was the sweet and lilting "Second Minuet." One of her encores was the song poem, "Nancy Hanks."
