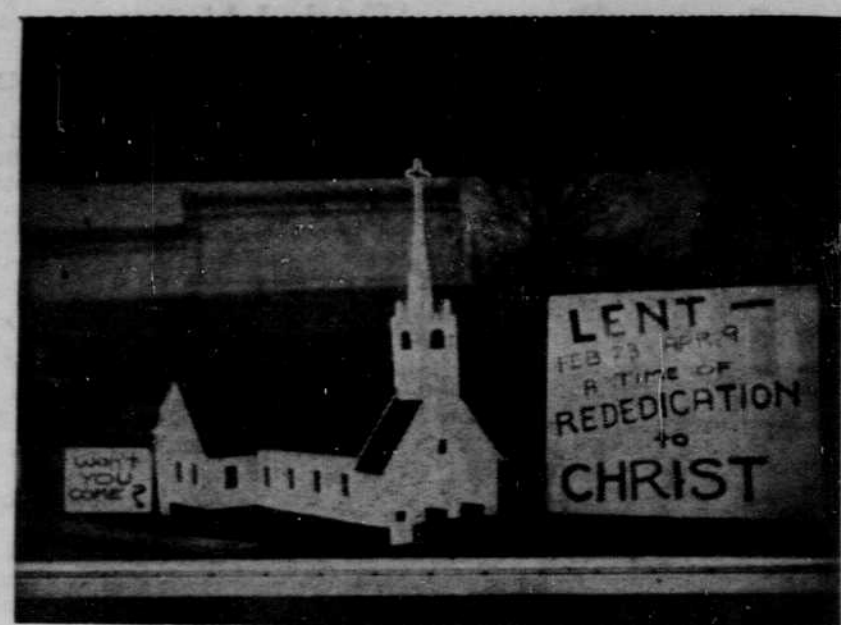
Lunch using part of the broiled food was served. The next meeting will be April 15 at the home of Mrs. Orville Svatos.
