

To the Citizens of O'Neill and Trade Territory:

For several years a parking problem has been developing in the Business District of O'Neill. There has been much discussion in a search for a proper solution. Complaints have been received from Farmers and Tradespeople alike. Most persons agree that there is no basic lack of parking space, but that it has not been properly regulated to provide the most convenience for the greatest number of people.

The use of Parking Meters has been suggested. However, there are still considerable objections against them. More recently the Chamber of Commerce has requested the City Council to consider the use of two-hour parking limitations within the Business District. This is considered one method of control which might be the least disagreeable.

The City Council has agreed to cooperate, and is instituting, effective immediately, two-hour parking regulations for the main down-town business streets on a trial basis for 30 days. Please bear in mind that this is merely an experiment for 30 days. We are asking for your voluntary cooperation to make this experiment work. We are seeking a solution which will provide adequate parking for the Farmers and Townspeople alike.

Hours of regulation will be from 8:00 A.M., to 6:00 P.M., all days excepting Sundays. We will be glad to have your observations and comments.
