a Cake Recipe?

BLACK CHOCOLOTE CAKE Five tablepoons boiling water, six tablespoons cocoa or three ounces baking chocolate, 1½ cups granulated sugar, ½ cupful butter, 1¾ cupfuls flour, ½ cup milk, one teaspoon vanilla, four eggs, two teasppons baking

Dissolve the chocolate, cut in small pieces, in the boiling water, cream the butter and sugar together well, add the yolks of the eggs (well beaten) and whip thoroughly. Then add the dis-solved chocolate (slightly cooled) or the cocoa, the flour sifted with whites and vanilla. Bake in a long shallow pan and ice with black chocolate icing made by creaming together one pound of confectioners sugar and 15 cm. ful cream, then adding three cunces baking chocolate melted over boiling water, and ½ teas spoon vanilla.
