Got a Mortgage

Every Nebraskan who has a mortgage on his farm or home will be sorry to learn that the "quickie foreclosure" bill is back again with the state legislature. The present law requires 30 days' public notice before a mortgage can be foreclosed. Under the measure now being considered, LB 142, foreclosure can be completed on only nine days' public notice. You might go on a 10-day vacation and return to find that your home or farm had been foreclosed.

If you have a mortgage, better write your senator now and ask him to vote against LB 142.
