## Veterans, FFA Students Compete

### 250 Entered in All-Day Event

Veterans from eight on-the-farm training schools in the area and vocational agriculture students from four high schools gathered here Saturday to compete in seven judging contests.

Veterans schools represented were Creighton, Orchard (two classes), Ewing, Spencer, Lynch, Atkinson and O'Neill.

FFA groups represented Creighton, Neligh, Atkinson and O'Neill high schools. There were two hundred and fifty contestants.

The contest began at 9:15 with registration. The judging began at 9:45 in the seven contests.

Beef judging was held at the C Bar M Hereford ranch with one class of aged bulls, one class of 2-year-old bulls, one class of yearling bulls and one class of yearling heifers with reasons on two classes.

The dairy contests consisted of one class of production cows, one class of 2-year-old heifers and one class of yearling heifer calves at Lloyd Gibson's place, southeast of O'Neill, and one class of production cows at James Corkle's, east of O'Neill. There were reasons on two classes.

The swine judging consisted of two classes of sows and two classes of butcher pigs with reasons on two classes, held at James McDonald's farm, southeast of O'Neill.

The crops contest had classes of prairie hay, alfalfa hay, alfalfa seed, oats seed, feeding corn and rye seed, with reasons on some classes. It was held at the high school.

The shop, farm management and soils contest consisted of written tests and was held at the high school.

The judging events were completed at noon. In the afternoon the contestants were shown films while the results of the judging were tallied.

At 4:15, the contestants assembled in the auditorium of the O'Neill high school and D. E. Nelson, superintendent of O'Neill high school, presented the ribbons to members of the top three teams and trophies to the high individuals in the veterans division. Mr. Nelson presented a plaque to the school winner in the FFA division, the O'Neill FFA teams placed first in the vocational agriculture division.

Atkinson FFA teams took first in beef judging, Creighton placed first in dairy and shop, second in soils, farm management, swine, and field crops. The large plaque awarded the winning school was presented to the O'Neill boys. Clem Stone is the O'Neill agriculture teacher.
