State Capitol News... Water Diversion Measure to Get Good Airing in Unicameral Today

LINCOLN—The big question here this week is water diversion. The hearing on Sen. Richard Marvel's LB 311 before the public works committee of the legislature to-day (Thursday) is to draw the largest crowd of any bill to come before this session.

"Nebraska cannot afford to permit water to be wasted. Most of the area involved is close to being what is called a semi-arid area. The issue until now has been simply this—Who has the first chance at the surplus water from the Platte river?"

Debate on the measure, introduced by Sens. C. Petrus Peterson of Lincoln and Fred A. S. State of Hastings, was among the session's bitterest. The bill was killed in committee and was raised on the floor.

Finally, on the motion of Speaker Walter R. Raecke of Central City—who has been the democratic candidate for governor in the past two elections—the bill was killed 23-19. Of those who voted to kill the bill, six are members of the 1953 session: Sens. Glenn Cramer of Albion, Earl Lee of Fremont, C. C. Lillibridge of Crete, Dwight Burney of Hartington, O. H. Person of Wahoo, and Harry Pizer of North Platte.

Of those who voted against killing the measure, three are back: Sens. Arthur Carmody of Trenton, Charles Tvrdik of Omaha and Karl Vogel of Omaha. Presiding over that session was Lt.-Gov. Robert B. Crosby, now the state's chief executive. He shocked and angered anti-diversionists some weeks ago with a precedent-breaking announcement that he would not veto a diversion bill this session.

Aurora, to transfer the collection of the state tax on gasoline from the Agriculture Department to the Tax Commission. The measure was the last of nine governmental reorganization bills which had the governor's blessing. The motion to kill it came from Sen. Charles Wilson of Norfolk, chairman of the government committee which had killed the other eight. The vote was 20-11 to kill.

Dim—The outlook for a state sales tax was pretty dim this week. The revenue committee has killed Sen. Terry Carpenter's version—which earmarked the revenue for highways—and applied the axe to a pair of constitutional amendment proposals which would, in effect, have taken the state out of the property tax field, thus paving the way for a sales tax.

Still alive, but just barely, is Sen. Dwight Burney's sales tax bill. Only reason it didn't go down the drain, too, is because he was to be absent this week and couldn't meet the three-day deadline under which he would have to move to have the bill raised. If he makes the deadline, only 22 votes are required; if he doesn't it takes 29.

Approved—The legislature stamped its tentative approval on a much-amended watershed enabling bill which its chief sponsor, Sen. O. H. Liebers of Lincoln accepted, "although you've made it plenty tough to form a watershed district."

The bill took up almost two full days of debate, making it easily the most-discussed bill on the floor. Only the 50 percent tax assessment law, LB 272, came close. The amendments, which came from several sources, including Liebers himself, generally tend to tighten the restrictions on setting up a district. There was no vote against its advancement.

Veterans—If you like success stories, consider the career of L. N. Ress, the new state engineer whom Governor Crosby appointed to succeed Harold Aitken. The 52-year-old Ress came up through the highway department's ranks from the lowly position of a surveyor's rod man in 1919. He left the department briefly in the 20's but has worked in the capital continuously since 1926. He was named design engineer in 1947 and Aitken
