The hearing on Sen. Richard Marvel's LB 311 before the public

watershed to another. The opposition is led by young Sen. Joseph D. Martin of Grand Island. He campaigned against Incumbent Sen. Herman Wellensiek and won on the diversion ssue. After spirited battles in the 1943 and 1947 sessons, diversion bills were killed.
