Kitchens and baths are the spaces most families want to improve first. "An important development for such modernizing is the installation of clay tile with adhesives," said Mr. Bailey. With this method clay tile can be applied in many cases over exist-ing walls and floors in need of ing Mrs. James Newman gave a waterproof surfaces. No tearing out is required, so that cost and time for the work can be materially reduced, he explained.

One of every 11 homes in the U.S. has water pipes repaired, a bathroom tiled or shower installed in an average year, according to the report. Six of every 100 have carpentry work done.

Home repair expenditures throughout the nation will total almost \$4 billion in 1953, the report estimated.
