- · According to figures given us by the State Tax Commismissioner, rural real estate is 31% of actual value and town real estate is 16% of actual value. This means that your present valuation on rural real estate will raise about three times and town property will raise about six times.
- All real estate will be brought up to actual value and you will be taxed on 50% of actual value. Where this is not done by the County, the State Board of Equalization will make the raise.
- The County Board of Equalization will convene on May 18 and will not be in session more than 40 days to hear complaints on present valuations.
