Postoffice Change Affects Package Size

Announcement last week that the O'Neill postoffice will be upped from a second- to first-class office will affect mailings of certain types of packages, according to Acting Postmaster Helen Sullivan.

The new classification means that packages between O'Neill and other first-class offices will be restricted to 40 pounds in weight and 72 inches in height in the first and second zones. Maximum weight of packages between first-class offices in the third through eighth zones will be limited to 20 pounds in weight.

Mrs. Sullivan points out, however, that packages between O'Neill's office and second, third and fourth class offices are acceptable up to 70 pounds.

As announced in The Frontier last week, the higher classification means an increase in box rentals and brings slightly higher salaries to employees in the office.

The reclassification becomes effective July 1. To gain a first-class rating an office must gross over 40-thousand-dollars. The O'Neill office during the fiscal year now ending will have exceeded 44-thousand-dollars.
