Neligh Vets Planning Giant Celebration

Bottle Shower Creates Fun

Summer suppers can often be prepared early in the morning and simply placed on the table when the evening meal hour comes.

You can prepare potato salad in early morning and keep it refrigerated in a cool part of the refrigerator. Stuffed eggs make good supper fare. These, too, may be prepared and refrigerated. Don't forget the various gelatin salads and, of course, cool, green tossed salads, the ingredients for which can be washed and placed in the crispier.

It takes only a few minutes then to fix the salad come mealtime.

Cold cuts of all kinds certainly lend themselves to supper meals. Then, how about chilled canned salmon or sardines? Or tuna, fixed in a salad or served in sandwiches? Don't overlook cottage cheese in various dishes. And how about the various kinds of cheese sliced and served with crackers or wafers?

Canned potato straws are fine for supper meals, heated or served just as they come from the can. And bags of potato chips are good—unless, of course, you are on a reducing diet. Chilled sliced tomatoes or sliced cucumbers or both sound the clarion call to cold meals. Or chill very thoroughly canned tomatoes and serve sprinkled with celery salt, and salt and pepper.

Here a cottage cheese salmon salad that is a main dish supper salad all will enjoy:

COTTAGE CHEESE SALMON SALAD
One cup cottage cheese, one cup red salmon (flaked), ½ cup celery (chopped), ½ cup sweet pickles (chopped), salt, pepper, ½ cup mayonnaise.

Combine ingredients in order given, chill to improve flavor. Serve with a tart salad dressing on lettuce. As a variation, tuna may be used instead of salmon.

three-months' subscription today. It is time to plan showers for brides. I have been asked several times to suggest something different than just the usual miscellaneous shower, so am enclosing a few suggestions that might help some.

A BOTTLE SHOWER
A bottle shower means each guest brings something in a bottle, such as vinegar, pickles, flapping, hand lotions, or olives. You can dress the bottles in crepe paper to resemble the wedding party and they will serve as decorations. Add wedding rings to the candleholders by covering the embroidery hoops with silver paper and then tying them with a bow to the candlesticks.

A ring toss game may be played by tossing one of these silver wrapped hoops over the bottle that is dressed like the bridegroom. Have two teams for this game. The team scoring the most rings wins. Give prizes for winning team which should be something in a bottle. As an olive bottle filled with different sized crochet hooks.

If winners care to, they may give their prize to the bride or bride-elect.

Refreshments should be a cold beverage served in the bottle, of course, and cake.

WASHDAY SHOWER
To the invitations attach a child's play clothespin. Decoration is a rope clothesline string across the room. Hang the packaged presents on this line. Or cut colorful garments from crepe paper and pin on the line. Gifts might be put into a large washtub which contains a scrub board for a novel presentation.

Guests should bring gifts such as soap, clothespin baskets, hampers and household linens. For entertainment have the guests dress clothespins to look like the bride party. This stunt requires paper, pins, paste and scissors. For refreshments, serve chocolate cake squares with whipped cream icing and your favorite punch. Call it super suds and the last rinse.

Here are a few games you might like to play at any type of shower.

ADVICE
Ask each guest to give advice for a happy marriage in terms of her own initials. Example, Katherine E. Smith advises, "Keep Expenses Small"; Maxine M. Applegate, "Make Meals Appealing."

SPEECH CONTEST
Hold a speech contest on "How to Train a Husband." Allow one or two minutes for each person's talk. Take a secret vote to determine the prizewinner.

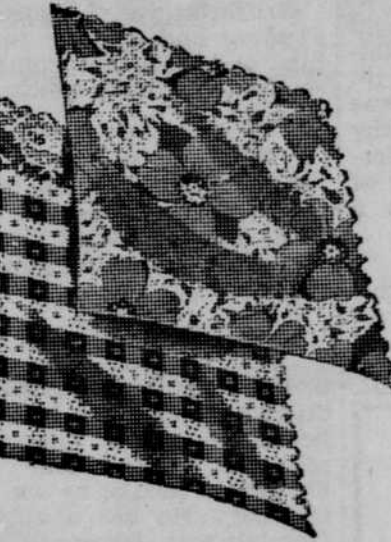
