\$32,527 Awarded in Chalker Case—A federal court jury in Norfolk last week awarded Mrs. Dewey Chalker of North Hollywood, Calif., a total of \$32,527.57 in a personal injury and property damage case involving three separate actions. The verdict was returned just before noon Friday.

Mrs. Chalker, who brought the suits as administrator of the estates of her son and daughter-in-law and as guardian of her granddaughter, originally asked for a total of \$247,281.93 from Darwin Seger, the owner, and LaVerne Van Every, the driver of an O'Neill oil transport which collided with her son's car August 13, 1951, three miles west of Osceola.
