Holt County Board of Equalization met as per adjournment. All members present.
Meeting called to order by the chairman.
Julian Sojka of the Ewing Creamery was in. After discussion it was decided to let this stand with the raise of \$2000.00.
Ramon Bright of Bright's Grocery appeared, but brought no invoice. The Board told him his books would be checked within a few days and the valuation arrived at then.
Phil Cohn representing the New Outlaw Grocery and Tony Asmus of the Outlaw Implements were in discussing their raises. They were told their books would be inspected.
The following complaints were discussed and motion was made by Frickel, seconded by Batenhorst that the following reductions be granted.
Mrs. Elizabeth Driskill—all of Block 25, Pioneer Townsite Co., 2nd Add. to Stuart—present valuation of the barn is \$1000.00 too high; valuation was reduced by \$100.00.

Busy Tree-Planting Season for SCS Holt Gets 200,000 Seedlings

As the end of the fiscal year approaches, the Holt Soil Conservation district supervisors feel the public might like to have a short report on the accomplishments of the soil conservation district during the past six months.
Tree planting season was ideal with nearly 200,000 trees planted in Holt county, 10.7 miles of shelterbelt was planted, 47 acres of farmstead windbreak, and 20 acres of wildlife plantings were made.

For these plantings the soil conservation district received 95,000 trees from the soil conservation service nurseries, 16,000 cedars were purchased by the district from Clark-McNary, 10,000 cottonwood purchased from Cliff Sobotka from Inman and some over 20,000 purchased from Plumfield nursery at Fremont. In addition fish and wildlife service planted in excess of 10,000 for wildlife planting, 36,000 were ordered by farmers through Clark-McNary, many of which were planted under direction of the Soil Conservation District and is estimated that the farmer obtained 5,000 or more for their own planting by pulling or from other commercial nurseries.

Tree plantings made by the soil conservation district were slightly under what has been planned the past few seasons but as a general rule individual plantings were smaller and less planting was made by the district's tree planting crew. However, the district made sales of trees to 143 different cooperators which is a record number of cooperators served by the tree planting program.

In addition there has been 300 acres seeded for range and over 700 acres seeded to native grass. Six livestock water dams have been constructed, two erosion control dams and three miles of terraces built. There are quite a lot of waterways and terraces under construction at the present time.

The district made a trial seeding of some native grasses for seed production this spring on the Heiss estate near the junctions of highways 20 and 108. Seedlings were made of sandhill blue stem, sandlove grass, switch grass and Indian grass. One of the purposes of this trial seeding is to determine whether it is better to precede grass seeding with a vetch seeding, whether they should be seeded together or if the vetch seeding should be made after the grass seedlings have been established. It will also give an indication as to how profitable grass seed production as a part of the farming and ranching enterprise might be.

In connection with the layout of PMA practices, soil conservation service technicians have recommended the need for 81 of the 99 practices where contracts have been made.
Only 23 of these practices have been constructed at the present time. This accounts for a considerable amount of technical time that as yet has not shown up in production records, and 75 new plans have been made which bring the total to 540 cooperators in the district covering 421,979 acres.

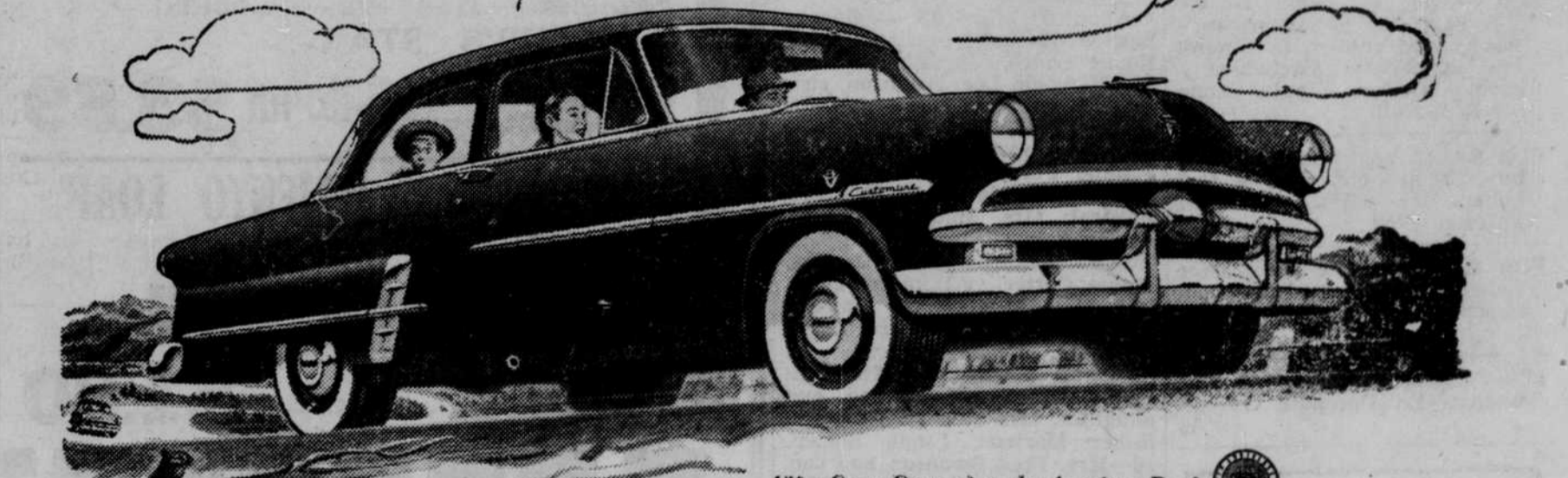
