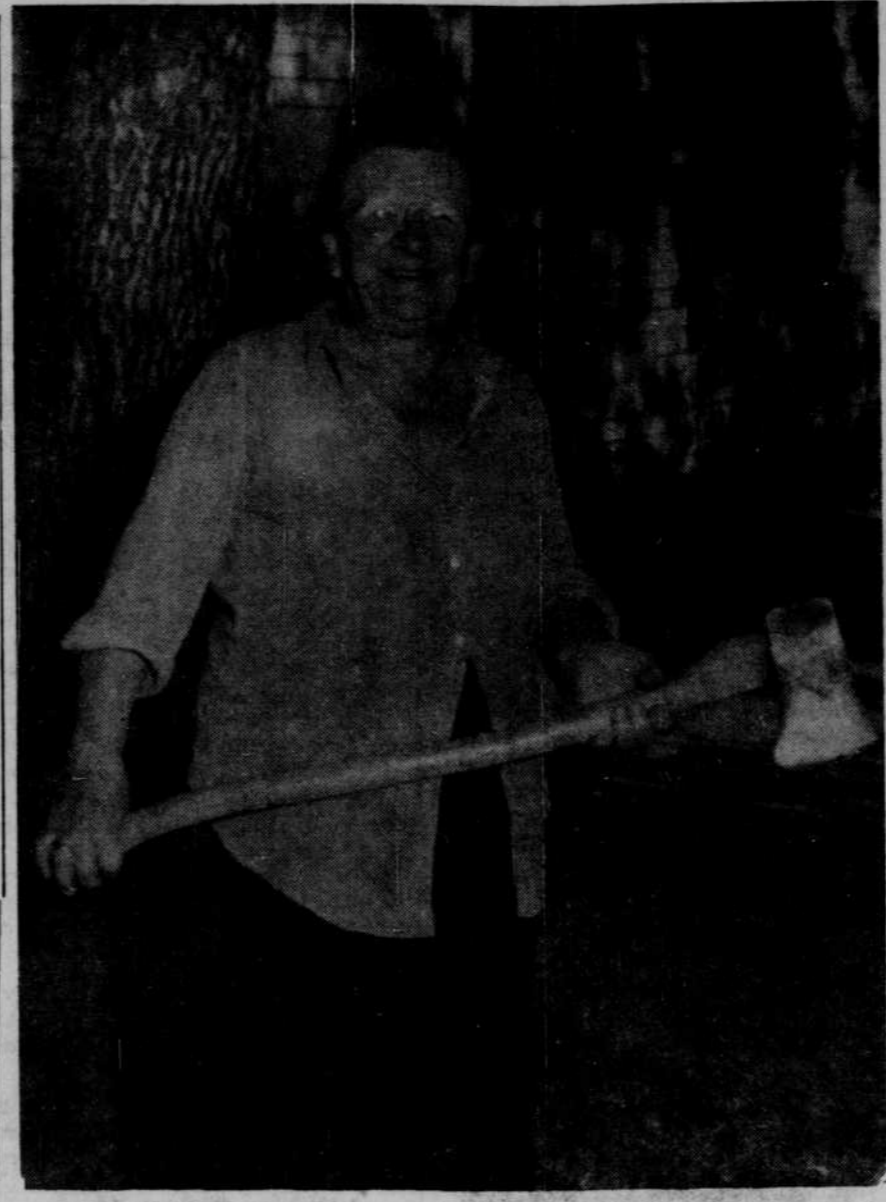
Reunion Scene

State Capitol News . . . Highway Engineers to Stretch \$35 Million

The highway department, smarting under criticism in the past, is breaking its back to get \$35 million in construction under contract in the next two years. They promised this much if the legislature would re-enact the 1949 road revenue measures. The legislature cut the bills down so only about \$33 million will be coming in, but the highway department thinks it can stretch to make the whole \$35 million. Partly, this is because of a good winter which didn't hurt the roads too much and also because of the "sufficiency rating" means that the department can plan ahead and not waste time on "blind alleys," Res said.

Incidentally, Res has privately advised his division engineers to try to discourage road delegations coming to Lincoln to see the governor. Res said he is convinced Governor Crosby is sticking by the "sufficiency plan" and isn't going to yield to pressure to build a road for political reasons. He told his engineers to tell prospective delegations they can learn just what Crosby is going to say by consulting highway department "sufficiency" maps without ever leaving home.

Reports filed with the secretary of state before the July 1 deadline show \$115,522.98 was spent for lobbying by 78 organizations during the 1953 legislative session.

That's an average of \$2,686.50 for each one of the senators. Actually, much more must have been spent because sequestered observers will tell you an active lobbyist will seldom list all he spends. Also, many lobbyists listed "no expenditures." And salaries of lobbyists were seldom included.

Top spender was the railroad lobby with \$25,058.60. Trailers were the Nebraska Wholesale Liquor Distributors' association with \$9,159.50; the Omaha Public Power district with \$5,826.83; Companion Companies (insurance) with \$5,094.34; the Omaha Taxpayers association with \$4,824.17; Northwestern Bell with \$4,655.37; Nebraska Brewers association with \$4,511.36, and the truckers' lobby with \$4,487.

Test Plot Yields 3 Tons Per Acre

Forty-five persons recently viewed two various fertilized native grassland plots and small grain fertilizer and variety plots in Holt county.

E. M. Brouse and Jack Russel of the college of agriculture, who are in charge of the plots, explained the treatments and answered the questions on the grassland work.

Neil Dawes, Holt county agent, explained the small grain variety plots and the irrigated fields.

Rudy Dvorsk of Atkinson, chairman of the Holt county grassland committee, showed the group some outstanding results from fertilizer which was applied last year to his native meadow.

He estimated that it would yield 2 to 2½ times as much as where he did not fertilize. Doctor Frolic stated that he didn't expect to see such response as he saw here in Holt county. When asked about Holt county having experimental work he replied, "You people of Holt county are raising money for this work, therefore, you should have work done here."

He commented that he thought the Holt county projects were extremely interesting. Mr. Brouse harvested the plots on Robert Clifford's the following day. He reported that he believed one plot would yield at the rate of nearly three tons per acre. In many of the plots the increased clover and grass was so pronounced that you might think some additional seed had been planted.

Shower Breaks Heat Spell Here

A shower amounting to .36 of an inch precipitation early Saturday broke the prolonged dry spell. The moisture was hardly enough to satisfy thirsty crops. Lynch reported an inch of rain, Amelia 1½ inches, Neligh two inches.

A belt between Spencer and O'Neill received hardly enough moisture to settle the dust. The rain, however, did bring an end to a heat wave which had gripped the region for several weeks. Nights have been unusually cool.
