Highway Engineers to Test Plot Yields Stretch \$35 Million

The highway department smarting under criticism in the past, is breaking its back to get \$35 million in construction under contract in the next two years They promised this much if the legislature would re-enact the 1949 road revenue measures. The legislature cut the bills down so only about \$33 million will be coming in, but the highway department thinks it can stretch to make the whole \$35 million. Partly, this is because of a good winter which didn't hurt the roads too much and also because use of the "sufficiency rating" means that the department can plan ahead and not waste time on "blind alleys," Ress said.

Incidentally, Ress has private-ly advised his division engineers to try to discourage road dele-gations coming to Lincoln to see the governor. Ress said he is convinced Governor Crosby is sticking by the "sufficiency plan" and isn't going to yield to pressure to build a road for political reasons.
