Tuesday, July 28th, Auction: Cattle receipts 340 head. The cow market showed some further decline from last week, but demand was improved with all interests buying. Top fat cows brought from 11.00 to 12.50 with heavy cutters at 10.00 to 10.50 and low cutters from 8.75 to 9.50. Canners from 7.50 to 9.00 per hundred.

The showing of replacement cattle consisted of smaller lots with but few loads on sale. Yearling heifers of medium quality brought from 14.00 to 15.50 with yearling steers going from 14.00 to 17.50 per hundred. No really choice cattle were offered.
