Yep, that's right, the calendar isn't lying. There's only one more day left in July. Beats the Dutch how the time flies, doesn't it?

Today is the day to pass along a recipe for a sauce that is fine with either hot or cold meats.

GOVERNOR SAUCE Twelve medium ripe tomatoes (unpeeled), 12 medium tart apples (unpeeled), nine large onions (peeled), three large green peppers (seeds and stems removed).

Mix ingredients and cook slowly until thick or about 1 1/2 hours, stirring frequently while cooking. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal. Delicious served with either hot or cold meats.

pie and coffee. One of the men said, "I'm going to send my wife out to get your recipe."

Well, it gave me the idea to send my recipe for banana cream pie to The Frontier.

So many times we try first this recipe and then that recipe and we just can't seem to find one that suits us. But—believe me, this is my standby. I'd like to say that the bananas have a lot to do with the pie, so do be sure that they're not green or overly ripe.

BANANA CREAM PIE Three-fourths cup sugar, 1/3 cup flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, two cups scalded milk, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, two tablespoons butter, two eggs (well beaten). Combine butter, sugar, salt, flour and eggs. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Cook over hot water until thick and smooth. Add flavoring. Pour into baked pastry shell. Cool. Serve with whipped cream. Top with sliced bananas and meringue. Of course, you slice bananas into the pie. The recipe also is a basic recipe for any kind of cream pie, pineapple, etc.

The Holt County Young Republicans held an organizational meeting in the assembly room of the courthouse in O'Neill on Thursday, July 23.

Temporary officers elected were John "Shane" O'Neill of O'Neill, chairman; and Leona Serck of Emmet, secretary-treasurer.

O'Neill also made a number of the appointments to set up a working structure for the club. These are Lawrence Hamik, director of the Stuart area and chairman of the rules committee; Mary Ann Kahler, director of the Atkinson area; Leona Serck, director of the Emmet area; and Dr. H. D. Gildersleeve, director of the O'Neill area.
