The list includes "I'm a Happy, Happy Christian", "Walkin' and Talkin' with Jesus", "Show Me the Way", "A Quiet Rest" and his latest song, featured in "Mr. Texas", and apparently headed for great popularity with Gospel singers—"Each Step of the Way."

When Billy Graham and Director Dick Ross began their search for the right actor to handle the leading part in "Mr. Texas", every effort led them straight to Redd Harper.
